Robert M. (OHT), a multinational, non-profit organization. OHT is dedicated to improving the health of people through the transformation of health IT. In these two roles, Dr. Kolodner is continuing his work to improve the health and well-being of individuals and communities worldwide by facilitating the widespread use and rapid, collaborative evolution of health IT tools and solutions.

Recently, Dr. Kolodner served as a strategic adviser to Georgia Institute of Technology's health IT initiatives.

Dr. Kolodner's 31 years of federal service and leadership include serving as the National Coordinator for Health IT and as the key clinical champion and national Chief Health Informatics Officer in the US Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). At the VA, he provided vision, direction, and effective leadership for the VA's award-winning suite of Electronic Health Records and Personal Health Records solutions.

Dr. Kolodner received his A.B. from Harvard and his MD from Yale. He is board certified in psychiatry and is a Fellow in the American College of Medical Informatics.

Mark Braunstein, MD, teaches health informatics at the Georgia Institute of Technology's Health Systems Institute, He is involved in research

aimed at wider and deeper adoption of health information technology to improve the quality and efficiency of care delivery.

He was co-founder, Chairman and CEO of Patient Care Technologies Inc. (PtCT), an ATDC Graduate company, a 1998 Inc. 500 company, and a leading provider of electronic patient record and care management systems to the home care industry. PtCT was acquired by MEDITECH in 2007.

Dr. Braunstein received his Bachelor of Science from MIT in 1969 and his MD degree from the Medical University of South Carolina (MUSC) in 1974. After an internship at Washington University, he joined the faculties of Medicine and Pharmacy at MUSC until he left in 1978 to co-found PROHECA, an early developer of clinical pharmacy systems.

He is the author of more than 50 papers, articles and book chapters devoted to various aspects of clinical automation. He is the immediate past Chairman of the Board of the Georgia Advanced Technology Ventures (GATV), a corporation that supports the Advanced Technology Development Center (ATDC), a technology incubator operated by the Georgia Institute of Technology. He has received numerous awards and recognitions.

From 2001 to 2010, Cook served as the Chief Executive Officer for the Medical Association of Georgia (MAG). During that time he restructured the organization, successfully streamlined its operations and applied increased resources to member services. Earlier, Cook served as MAG's General Counsel and Director of Advocacy.

Cook's career spans the legal and legislative arenas, both at the state and federal levels. His affiliation with the Georgia General Assembly began in 1976 when he served as the Reading Clerk for the Georgia State Senate. In 1984, after completing law school, Cook served as a top aide to State Senator Nathan Deal, who chaired the Senate Judiciary Committee and served as president pro tempore of the Georgia Senate. When Deal was elected to Congress in 1992, Cook served him in Washington, D.C., from 1992-1995 as his Chief of Staff.

Cook was the managing partner in the law firm of McGuire, Cook, & Martin P.C. from 1984 to 1992, specializing in corporate law and contract litigation.

He is a graduate of the University of Georgia School of Law and a graduate of Georgia Southern University.

DCH is designated as the single state agency for managing Medicaid and PeachCare for Kids,\* covering 1.7 million Georgians. DCH also administers the State Health Benefit Plan, which provides health care coverage for nearly 700,000 Georgia state employees, teachers, school workers, retirees and their dependents. Combined, these two divisions have a budget of almost \$12 billion and provide health insurance coverage to approximately one-fourth of the state's population.

As the lead agency for Georgia's Health Information Technology initiatives, DCH is transforming the delivery of health care in the state. Two major initiatives underway include the Medicaid Electronic Health Records Incentive Program and the new Statewide Health Information Exchange. An HIE Challenge Grant recipient, DCH is also working with Georgia Tech and the Rome (Floyd County) medical community on a consumer-mediated electronic health record system.

DCH also licenses and regulates more than 14,000 Georgia health care facilities, including hospitals, nursing homes and personal care homes, and administers the state's health planning functions, including Certificate of Need.


