

Acute Care, Psychiatric and Specialty (PRTFs) Programs and Services Georgia Department of Community Health

Residential mental health facilities for children and youth are specialized kinds of hospitals which provide which provide 24-hour care and have as their primary function the diagnosis and treatment of patients to age twenty-one (21) who have psychiatric disorders to restore them to an optimal level of functioning.

Exemptions:

Any residential mental health facility for children and youth operated by the federal government

Type Regulation:

State: A facility must first obtain a certificate of need in order to be eligible for a permit. A facility choosing to participate in federal programs must be certified.
