# **Program Origin**

House Bill 166 was enacted in 2005 and amended in 2006 with House Bill 1224. This legislation created the "Health Share Volunteers In Medicine Act" to increase access to quality health and dental care and encourage volunteerism.





# **Program Mission**

To increase and promote access to quality health care by providing sovereign immunity protection to health care professionals donating medical and dental services to eligible clients









- Health care volunteers donate their time to treat eligible patients who would otherwise have no access to care (i.e., primary care, specialty care, dental and vision treatment)
- The State of Georgia provides sovereign immunity protection to participating/contracted health care professionals, eliminating concern for litigation as long as the health care provider acts within the contracted scope of service







A typical patient uses the Emergency Room as a Primary Care Physician or waits until the illness/disease progressively worsens, requiring expensive hospital care. Our program's mission is to provide alternative access to medical treatment, thus deterring reliance on the ER.







# **Program Goals**

- Increase access to health care
- Reduce DCH risk of liability
- Increase internal communication and support to clinics





# **Program Objectives**

- Expand services in 20 clinics by at least one additional service
- Expand the number of clinics participating in the program by adding 15 new clinics to the network
- Increase the number of patient visits by five percent per region









# **Program Objectives**

- Increase the number of licensed health care providers/volunteers by 150
- Increase the number of Eligibility Specialists (lay volunteers) by 100
- Increase community partnerships by 100





# **Program Objectives**

- Conduct Quality Assurance reviews at 95
  percent of participating clinics
- Perform refresher training sessions at 90 percent of participating clinics
- Conduct at least one regional meeting in each region of the state to facilitate collaboration among clinics and networking





# **Program Structure**

- 52 clinics participating statewide
- Nearly 1,550 licensed health care providers under contract
- Approximately 610 non-licensed Eligibility and Referral Specialists across the state
- 325 corporation/professional associations participating

## **Program Administration**

- Enforcement of program rules and regulations
- Development and implementation of program policies and procedures
- Credentialing and contracting of licensed health care providers
- Processing of non-licensed volunteers
- Volunteer recruitment
- Program marketing and outreach
- Training and technical support functions
- Quality assurance activities
- Identification and development of community partnerships





# **Program Requirements**

- Licensed health care volunteers may not be compensated for services rendered
- Patients may not be charged for services received at participating health care centers
- Clinics must be properly licensed, accredited as public or private organizations, hospitals or other facilities, and must be located within the State of Georgia







# **Patient Eligibility Requirements**

Eligible populations include:

- The uninsured
- The under-insured (insurance does not cover treatment being sought)
- Medicaid-eligible individuals
- Persons whose income is ≤ 200 percent of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL)







# **Patient Eligibility Requirements**

- Patients are screened for eligibility by trained volunteers
- Only patients determined eligible by DCH receive free care
- Health care providers receive sovereign immunity protection only if the patient treated has been determined eligible for services







# **Statewide Impact**

### FY 2008


- 62,521 patient visits conducted in 12-month period
- 48,259 hours contributed by licensed health care providers
- \$6.950 million in donated health care services
- \$7.226 million in donated health care goods (i.e., labs, meds, etc.)
- 78,837 hours contributed by non-licensed volunteers
- \$1.538 million in services performed by non-licensed volunteers

Total dollar value of services provided by the GVHCP: \$15.715 million
